SUBMISSION GUIDELINES

Provisions for submitting resolutions to the 2017 AFT-Oregon Convention are contained in Article IV, Section 1 of the Bylaws of the AFT-Oregon Constitution:

Section 1. Resolutions to the Convention may be introduced by locals or the Executive Council of AFT-Oregon in this manner:

- a. A resolution must be mailed or e-mailed to the AFT-Oregon Office postmarked or date stamped no later than thirty (30) calendar days prior to the opening of the Convention if it is to be considered;
- b. It shall contain the title and shall be submitted to the AFT-Oregon President as a text based document and a pdf. The resolution shall bear the signature of at least two elected officers of the local submitting the resolution;
- c. The officers signing the resolution shall certify that the resolution was approved for submission to the Convention by the local executive board or membership, or by the Executive Council of AFT-Oregon.

The following resolutions were postmarked according to the above provisions.

Resolution # 2017-1

1 Adequate Resources and Training for Community College Public Safety 2 3 Whereas, community college public safety and campus security departments strive to maintain a safe 4 environment for students, faculty, and staff; manage crisis responses; and assist with emergencies; and 5 Whereas, as a result of repeated budget cuts and lack of revenue, many community colleges have reduced resources available to their public safety departments; and 6 7 Whereas, resources and knowledge could be pooled and coordinated among community college and other institutions of higher education in order to effectively use funds and share best practices; and 8 9 Whereas, active shooter incidents have taken place in Oregon causing injury and death, and the level of 10 preparation can greatly impact the effective response to future incidents; and 11 Whereas, culturally responsible practices are necessary for ensuring a safe learning environment for all; 12 now 13 14 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate for statewide certification (beyond the current 15 classification of general private security), training, and resources for community college public safety and campus security departments; and 16 17 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate for resource sharing and collaboration for practitioners involved in campus safety and disaster resilience; and 18 19 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate for developing funding options for community 20 colleges to upgrade and maintain physical security infrastructure such as cameras, alarms, data storage, lighting, and mass notifications; and 21 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate for a curriculum and standards for dealing with 22 active shooter incidents for students, faculty, and staff that can be adapted to each campus; and 23 Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate for statewide training so that public safety 24 25 personnel can use culturally-competent practices in performing their duties.

3	Whereas, AFT-Oregon has already committed to a Renewed Commitment to Build a Culture of
4	Organizing within Oregon; and
5	Whereas, unions all over the country face a new threat from the current administration; and
6	Whereas, this threat looks to attack our constitutional right and duty to collectively assemble, for which
7	is necessary to maintain union strength and labor rights; and
8	Whereas, we cannot wait for the administration to begin to form and enact their laws attacking unions
9	and union membership; and
10	Whereas, communication is imperative for cohesive organization of union members at the local, state,
11	and national levels to confront this threat; and
12	Whereas, union fragmentation is one of the leading causes to the reduction in union membership all
13	over the country; and
14	Whereas, effective union communication must not be limited to in-person meetings, but must also be
15	conducted through online means; and
16	Whereas, all union members should be able to share conversations, potentially sensitive information,
17	and/or plans for organizing efforts in a manner that is secure; and
18	Whereas, communication sent through unencrypted online messaging services makes union members
19	vulnerable to observation by outside parties; now
20	
21	Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will strive to create a better working relationship with NEA,
22	SEIU, and other AFL-CIO connections; and
23	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will create a working group to develop an informative resource
24	on data encryption for union members; and
25	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will establish recommended practices for local chapters to
26	adopt that are sufficiently protected means of online communication; and
27	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will work toward intra-union solidarity between K-12 and
28	Higher Ed; and
29	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will work to create platforms on social media and traditional
30	media to encourage engagement between all unions, not just AFT members; and
31	Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will recommend to AFT-National to push better means of
32	coalition building between their member unions and other unions across the country.

1 Union Representation and Rights for AFT Project Employees 2 3 Whereas, AFT is a union of workers dedicated to promote fairness, community engagement, organizing, 4 collective bargaining and political activism; and 5 Whereas, much of the AFT workforce consists of "project staff", temporarily hired organizers hired for the length of individual external organizing campaigns; and 6 7 Whereas, many of these project staff are unrepresented by a collective bargaining unit themselves; and Whereas, the current categorization of external organizing campaigns undertaken by AFT as "projects" 8 9 perpetuates an environment hostile to the establishment of bargaining units among project employees 10 of AFT and that decreases the job security of these employees; and Whereas, AFT is an employer and is required by labor law to respect the collective bargaining rights and 11 12 protections of its employees that are members of unions; and Whereas, as a union AFT-Oregon should support the unionizing rights of all workers everywhere; now 13 14 15 Therefore Be It Resolved, that the AFT-Oregon will provide a welcome environment for its temporary employees to organize themselves; and 16 17 Be It Further Resolved, that that AFT-Oregon will not stand in the way of unionization efforts by any staff, and will recognize any union organized by temporary staff; and 18 19 Be It Further Resolved, that any staff hired by AFT-Oregon to work more than 10 hours a week should 20 be given the option to be considered part of the staff bargaining unit; and Be It Further Resolved, that the AFT-Oregon will undertake an unbiased review of the structure of its 21 external organizing campaigns that promote the lengthy and disproportionate use of temporary hiring 22 practices; and 23 24 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon should make available information regarding temporary hiring 25 practices, including, but not limited to, number of temporary hires, projects that temporary hires are on, 26 organizational structure for hiring and dismissal of these employees, duration of employment, likelihood 27 of full time employment after temporary hire, how many projects are they hired on before they receive 28 a full time positions, and information about how many temporary hires never receive a full time 29 position; and 30 Be It Further Resolved, that the AFT will respect the union rights of project organizers that are currently

- Whereas, education is a fundamental human right that can't be denied to students with learning or
- 4 behavior disabilities; and
- 5 Whereas, the staff who provide services to these students are often the ones hurt when students
- 6 needing behavior support act out violently; and
- 7 Whereas, the Oregon Intervention System (OIS) provides strategies to mitigate the risk to others from
- 8 violent outbursts; and
- 9 Whereas, substitute educational assistants often lack proper training on how to handle students on
- 10 behavior support plans which puts everyone at risk; and
- Whereas, proper training is available but substitutes must often pay for it themselves if they want to
- 12 gain those skills; and
- 13 Whereas, access to Individual Support Plans, which contains important behavior information, is
- 14 controlled by the classroom teachers who don't always provide this information to educational
- 15 assistants; and
- 16 Whereas, when staff don't have access to student information, they are unable to avoid triggers that
- 17 can push students into an uncontrollable state where they lash out violently; and
- 18 Whereas, our educational assistants are currently in harm's way without the necessary supports to keep
- them safe; now

- 21 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for legislation that requires substitute educational
- assistants to complete training in the Oregon Intervention System (OIS) before they work with students
- on a Behavior Support Plan; and
- 24 **Be It Further Resolved**, that this legislation also require that training costs must be covered by the
- 25 employer; and
- 26 **Be it Finally Resolved**, that AFT-Oregon advocates for changes in education regulations that guarantee
- that educational assistants have access to Individual Education Plans of the students they serve.

3	Whereas, Oregon consistently faces major budget shortfalls due to our unstable tax structure and a
4	massive decline in the corporate share of income taxes; and
5	Whereas, the choice to keep Oregon's corporate taxes the lowest in the nation has had a devastating
6	impact on education funding; and
7	Whereas, attempts to increase revenue have been hindered by a lack of information about what the
8	actual tax liabilities are for companies operating in Oregon, allowing opponents to propagate a
9	disingenuous narrative about the impact of additional corporate taxes; and
10	Whereas, the political climate is ready to have a substantive discussion about tax reform; and
11	Whereas, information about companies that take advantage of special provisions in the taxation laws is
12	difficult to find; and
13	Whereas, good policy depends on good data to drive discussions of reform to a place where the
14	problem is actually fixed; now
15	
16	Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for policies that require the state to maintain a
17	public database of tax liabilities for large companies; and
18	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for policies that require that the usage of any special
19	tax provision, agreement, or accounting practice used by a large company to lower their tax liability
20	must be regularly reported to the public; and
21	Be it Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will work to educate their members on how taxes are assessed
22	in the State of Oregon.

1 **In Support of Stable Housing for Students** 2 3 Whereas, Oregon is currently experiencing an affordable housing crisis where communities lack the 4 inventory to support the influx of high paid workers migrating to our state; and 5 Whereas, landlords are taking advantage of the increased demand by evicting their current tenants in 6 order to dramatically increase the rent; and 7 Whereas, many members of AFT-Oregon who perform vital work in metropolitan areas, such as classified employees, graduate employees, child care workers, and part-time faculty, are struggling to 8 9 find and maintain affordable housing; and 10 Whereas, it is difficult for evicted families to find nearby, available housing, often resulting in them 11 being forced to move out of their current community; and 12 Whereas, students in these situations are often forced to change schools in the middle of an academic 13 year; and Whereas, stable enrollment at a familiar school is a key factor to student success, which a sudden 14 15 eviction can erode; and Whereas, a family that is able to find a way to afford a massive rent increase is often left without 16 enough money for food, healthcare, or utilities, further eroding a student's academic success; and 17 Whereas, no-cause evictions disproportionately impact families of color, resulting in erosion of the 18 19 cultural diversity of our classrooms, leading to a diminished variety of experiences for our students; now 20 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for the creation of Just Cause Eviction Standards 21 to prevent sudden, unexpected homelessness; and 22 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will advocate to allow families with children enrolled in a K-12 23 school to defer eviction to the end of the current school year; and 24 25 Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon advocates for the repeal of the prohibition on local jurisdictions

2 **Corporate Profits** 3 4 Whereas, Oregon public schools are systematically underfunded with unequal distribution of those 5 6 Whereas, the present division of public education funding by geographic location through property 7 taxes in school districts results in unequal levels of investment among public schools, often along racial 8 and class lines; and Whereas, Oregon has one of the lowest corporate tax rates in the United States, increasing its budget 9 deficit each year, with a current debt of 86.7 Billion [1]; and 10 Whereas, public schools funded by local property taxes gives students who, by no fault of their own, 11 were born into more-or-less well funded school districts unequal quality of, and access to, public 12 13 education; and 14 Whereas, this inequality of education funding further deepens longterm class and income inequalities 15 and restricts the economic mobility necessary for a fair and free democratic society; and 16 Whereas, in order to balance budgets, public K-12 school systems are attacking teachers' unions by 17 slashing wages and benefits; and 18 Whereas, Oregon universities are also coming under increased pressures to balance budgets, 19 disproportionately at the expense of faculty and graduate employee unions; and 20 Whereas, As a result of systematic underfunding of public education, Oregon public schools at all levels 21 have an extremely high student to teacher ratio and skyrocketing tuition, threatening quality of 22 education which prevents student success; and 23 Whereas, these many problems associated with Oregon's systematically under funded and inequitably distributed public school funds can be rectified through the combination of redistributing property taxes 24 25 across the state and by imposing a tax on corporate profits; and Whereas, our role as educators and union members imposes a political duty to cultivate a well-educated 26 27 and thriving public sphere; now

Therefore Be It Resolved, AFT-Oregon will establish a statewide lobbying campaign to pressure local and state legislators to increase funding for public education via redistribution of property taxes and

imposing a tax on corporate profits; and

32 **Be It Further Resolved,** AFT-Oregon will stipulate that these funds will go into the education system in a

fair and equitable manner; and

34 **Be It Finally Resolved,** that AFT national will support similar measures in all 50 states and at the federal

35 level.

1	Stand with Nabisco Workers in the U.S. and Across the Globe
2	
3	Whereas, in July 2015, Mondelez, the new owner of Nabisco-branded products, announced that it
4	would send 600 workers' jobs from Chicago to its new plant in Salinas, Mexico after workers refused to
5	accept unreasonable company demands of \$46 million in wage and benefit cuts annually amounting to
6	60% of their current wages and benefits; and
7	Whereas, Mondelez/Nabisco's decision to send production to Mexico continues its business model
8	where past brands made in the U.S. are sent across borders to evade family-sustaining wages, workers'
9	rights and other laws of the U.S. and those products are still produced for the American market at, or
10	essentially at, the same sales price when made in the U.S. but now made in Mexico which has a Federal
11	minimum wage of just \$4 a day; and
12	Whereas, this one-way business model exploits workers on both sides of borders or oceans – those who
13	lose jobs in high-wage countries and those that receive these jobs at poverty wages – by virtue of unfair
14	trade competition and governmental repression, such as in Mexico, where wages are kept down to
15	attract global business enterprises that use these exploitive conditions to benefit a global few at the
16	expense of many; and
17	Whereas, plant closures devastate communities and families, as well as state and county tax bases; and
18	Whereas, in Chicago, in the 1990's, Nabisco took \$90 million in subsidies from Illinois taxpayers and 20
19	years later they are abandoning the taxpayers' investment; and
20	Whereas, Nabisco's continued corporate policy of closing plants to take advantage of low-wage workers
21	has been a windfall for its top executives and largest shareholders, including Irene Rosenfeld, the CEO of
22	Mondelez, which owns Nabisco, who raked in approximately \$185 million in compensation over eight
23	years, while billions of dollars went to the largest investors in dividends and stock buybacks; and
24	Whereas, the continual loss of jobs to low-wage countries with non-free union workplaces limits current
25	and future generations of Americans from attaining good family-sustaining jobs in all work segments,
26	and in particular limits the earning power of new student graduates entering the job market who are
27	already saddled with enormous financial liabilities even before they get their first job; and
28	Whereas, the continuation of these corporate-driven trade deals and irresponsible corporate business
29	models have, and will continue to, eliminate work opportunities in student career paths as work in fields
30	of study is continually moved across borders and oceans as employers seek the cheapest labor rates
31	possible resulting in more Americans who cannot compete with low-wage workers and live in dignity as
32	they work; now
33	
34	Therefore Be It Resolved , that AFT-Oregon supports the efforts to maintain family-sustaining U.S.
35	employment as well as to stand up against global worker exploitation which results from business
36	models such as those being utilized in non-free union workplaces and across the world by
37	Mondelez/Nabisco by sending an open letter to CEO Irene Rosenfeld outlining its displeasure with this
38	economically and socially destructive business plan; and

39	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon direct its procurement officers, personnel, and vendors to not
40	support the sale of or the dispensing of products made by Mondelez under its Nabisco brand that are
41	made in non-free union workplaces upon the date of this resolution's passage; and
42	Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon encourage locals to also direct their procurement officers,
43	personnel, and vendors to not support the sale of or the dispensing of products made by Mondelez
44	under its Nabisco brand that are made in non-free union workplaces upon the date of this resolution's
45	passage; and
46	Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will pressure our employers to sell and carry anywhere on its
47	campuses only Nabisco products made in free union workplaces until such time as Mondelez/Nabisco
48	repatriates the 600 jobs that were sent to Mexico in 2016 and Mondelez/Nabisco ends its movement of
49	jobs from the U.S. to low-wage economies with non-free union workplaces when such products
50	produced across borders and oceans are then returned to the U.S. economy for sale.

- Whereas, we need to ensure every working Oregonian will have paid time away from work to welcome
- a new child, to recover from a serious illness, or to care for a loved one who is recovering from a serious
- 7 illness; and
- 8 Whereas, women continue to face barriers to staying in the workforce and maintaining their earnings
- 9 when family caregiving needs arise, since women still provide the majority of unpaid caregiving within
- the home, whether it is for a child or for an elderly parent, as well as being the primary or co-
- 11 breadwinner in more than two-thirds of families; and
- 12 Whereas, access to reproductive health care is critical for the health and economic security of all
- 13 Oregonians, regardless of income, citizenship status, gender identity, or type of insurance; and
- 14 Whereas, health insurance coverage is one of the single most effective ways to ensure that children
- receive the preventative health and medical care they need to thrive in school and life; and
- 16 Whereas, when children have access to health care through Medicaid, studies show they have improved
- 17 education outcomes and higher incomes later in life; and
- 18 Whereas, more than 17,000 children are currently excluded from Oregon Health Plan because of their
- 19 residency status; now

- 21 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon supports the creation of a paid family and medical leave
- 22 program to cover all Oregonians; and
- 23 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT supports reproductive health care for all regardless of income,
- 24 citizenship status, gender identity, or type of insurance; and
- 25 **Be It Finally Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon supports access to the Oregon Health Plan and other health
- 26 insurance programs for all regardless of documentation status.

This stigma is manifested by bias, distrust, stereotyping, fear, embarrassment, anger, and/or 5 avoidance; and 6 Whereas, many of AFT-Oregon's members have health benefits that do not include comprehensive 7 access to mental health care professionals; and Whereas, a U.S. Surgeon General Report indicates that one in five children and adolescents will face a 8 significant mental health condition during their school years; and 9 10 Whereas, mental health disorders affecting children and adolescents can range from attention deficit 11 hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) to autism, depression, eating disorders, and schizophrenia; and 12 Whereas, the key responsibility of school and university leaders regarding this issue includes creating a 13 safe and nurturing school environment, supporting the physical and mental health of children and young adults, fostering their social and emotional well-being, and being prepared to address teen suicide 14 15 through effective communication and support; and Whereas, according to the Coalition to Support Grieving Students, death by suicide is the third leading 16 17 cause of death in children ages 10-14 and the second leading cause of death in teens age 15-19; and Whereas, students who experience suicidal thoughts will go to their teacher, instructor, or professor 18 19 who do not always have the resources and/or training for these students; and 20 Whereas, mental health access on campuses and schools is limited, and where available, can include a 4 to 6 week wait to see a mental health professional; and 21 Whereas, promotion of student mental health is a critical component of improving school climate, 22 23 safety, and learning; now 24 25 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will support and encourage the state to provide school and 26 university leaders with best practices for dealing with teen suicide and other school crises related to 27 mental health; and 28 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon work to provide a safe environment for its teachers and 29 instructors by pushing for funding and support for programs to build their capacity to support 30 comprehensive school-based interventions, and coordinate mental wellness services across schools and universities; and 31 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will work to encourage schools across the state to work with 32 parents, students, school staff, and principals to discuss suicide in a careful and effective manner; and 33 34 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will encourage school districts to enable local communities to implement a comprehensive culturally and linguistically appropriate school-based mental health 35 36 programs that support and foster the health and development of students and instructors; and 37 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will fight for increased funding for mental health facilities

across the state for both its members and their students; and

- 39 **Be It Finally Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon will communicate with AFT-National to pressure the federal
- 40 government to give states and local communities the ability to combine federal and state funding from
- separate agencies to address mental health and school safety issues at the local level.

1 Resolution to Support the Reproductive Health Equity Act 2 3 Whereas, access to reproductive health care is critical for the health and economic security of all 4 Oregonians; and 5 Whereas, everyone in Oregon, regardless of income, citizenship status, gender identity, or type of insurance, needs access to the full range of reproductive health services; and 6 7 Whereas, approximately 18,600 women of reproductive age in Oregon are forced by their insurance plans to pay out-of-pocket costs for preventive health services, including contraception [1]; and 8 Whereas, an estimated 43,000 women of reproductive age in Oregon who purchase insurance on the 9 10 Healthcare Exchange, as well as an unknown number of women with employer-sponsored coverage, 11 have policies with deductibles of \$2,500 or more[1]; and 12 Whereas, the cost of a reproductive procedure such as abortion must first come out of this deductible, leaving the procedure unaffordable and inaccessible for many; and 13 14 Whereas, 48,000 women of reproductive age in Oregon are categorically excluded from Medicaid and 15 prohibited from purchasing insurance on the Healthcare Exchange due to their citizenship status [1], leaving them without coverage for essential health services like reproductive health care; and 16 17 Whereas, transgender and gender-nonconforming Oregonians need access to services often categorized as "women's" health care; and 18 19 Whereas, often these services are unavailable to transgender and gender-nonconforming Oregonians 20 when coverage is dependent on a binary gender marker; and Whereas, House Bill 3391, called the Reproductive Health Equity Act, will bridge the gap for the tens of 21 thousands of Oregonians who need access to life-saving reproductive care; and 22 Whereas, the Reproductive Health Equity Act ensures that Oregonians receive the full range of 23 24 preventive reproductive health services at zero out-of-pocket cost, fills gaps in reproductive health 25 coverage for those categorically excluded from health programs due to citizenship status, and prohibits 26 discrimination in reproductive health care; now 27 28 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon and its affiliated locals support the passage of the 29 Reproductive Health Equity Act; and 30 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will join the existing coalition, consisting of American Civil Liberties Union of Oregon, Asian Pacific American Network of Oregon, Family Forward Oregon, NARAL 31 32 Pro-Choice Oregon, Oregon Latino Health Coalition, Planned Parenthood Advocates of Oregon and 33 Western States Center; and 34 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will use lobbying resources to support the passage of the bill, including adding HB 3391 to the list of bills supported by members on AFT-Oregon lobby day, notifying 35 36 members of opportunities to speak on behalf of HB 3391, and instructing the Director of Political and

Legislative Affairs to meet with legislators to encourage the passage of HB 3391; and

Be It Finally Resolved, that AFT-Oregon will encourage AFT National to work for a similar bill at the national level.

3	Whereas, AFT- Oregon prides itself on the diversity of its membership and is committed to ensuring no
4	members are discriminated against "based on race, creed, ethnicity, sex, sexual orientation, gender
5	identity, social, political or economic status, national origin, age, or disability" [1]; and
6	Whereas, on December 7, 2015, Donald J. Trump, as a candidate for the Republican party's nomination
7	for President of the United States, announced his intention "for a total and complete shutdown of
8	Muslims entering the United States" [2]; and
9	Whereas, on January 27, 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed an executive order titled "Protecting
10	the nation from foreign terrorist entry into the United States" which bans individuals from the
11	predominantly Muslim countries of Sudan, Syria, Yemen, Iran, Iraq, Libya, and Somalia from entering the
12	United States for 90 days, prevents all refugees from entering the United States for 120 days, and
13	indefinitely suspends the entry of refugees from Syria [3]; and
14	Whereas, the Ninth Circuit of Appeals considered the possibility that the aforementioned executive
15	order constituted a violation of the First Amendment in its unanimous ruling against the executive
16	order; and
17	Whereas, on March 6, 2017, President Donald J. Trump signed a slightly revised executive order titled
18	"Protecting the nation from foreign terrorist entry into the United States" which bans the issuance of
19	visas to individuals from the predominantly Muslim countries of Sudan, Syria, Yemen, Iran, Libya, and
20	Somalia for 90 days and prevents all refugees from entering the United States for 120 days [4]; and
21	Whereas, these executive orders provide a pathway for permanently blocking immigration from these
22	majority Muslim nations; and
23	Whereas, these executive orders are an affront to religious freedom according to the First Amendment
24	to the United States Constitution; and
25	Whereas, the original executive order was implemented in a disorganized manner without the vetting of
26	departments in charge of protecting American national security, such as the United States Department
27	of Defense, the Department of Homeland Security, and the United States Department of Justice; and
28	Whereas, as a result of the original executive order, individuals in possession of visas were detained or
29	sent back at airports, resulting in chaos, confusion, and anxiety; and
30	Whereas, an estimated 134 million people - including 160 students at Oregon State University, 39
31	students at University of Oregon, and 76 students at Portland State University – were temporarily
32	banned from entering/re-entering the United States and continue to face uncertainty about their
33	current and future immigration status[5]; and
34	Whereas, the federal Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965 banned all discrimination against
35	immigrants on the basis of national origin, in order to eliminate prejudice and bias from the immigration
36	process [6]; and
37	Whereas, the federal Immigration and Nationality Act of 1965 unambiguously restricts presidential

authority by stating that no person can be "discriminated against in the issuance of a visa because of the

- 39 person's race, sex, nationality, place of birth, or place of residence", and that the only exceptions are
- 40 granted by the United States Congress; and
- 41 Whereas, these executive orders are in violation of this national law due to their discriminatory policies
- 42 based on national origin [6]; and
- Whereas, any attempt to prevent entry by a class of people based on race, religion, or national origin is
- 44 contrary to American values and puts Americans at home and abroad at risk; now

- 46 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-Oregon condemns both executive orders titled "Protection of the
- 47 Nation from foreign terrorist entry into the United States," issued on January 27, 2017 and March 6,
- 48 2017 as open acts of discriminatory overreach that illegally target immigrants based on their religion
- 49 and national origin and urges President Donald J. Trump to immediately rescind these orders; and
- 50 **Be It Further Resolved,** that AFT-Oregon will sign on as author and/or join amicus briefs from AFT
- opposing these orders and any similar orders; and

Resolution to Prevent the Presence of Armed Officers in Schools 1 2 3 Whereas, all AFT members agree that schools should be institutes wherein children are able to learn in a 4 secure environment without distraction or threat; and 5 Whereas, all AFT members agree that the role of teachers is to provide instruction and guidance for 6 their students, not to act as law enforcement; and 7 Whereas, budgets of schools across the nation, and particularly in Oregon, are already often not sufficient enough to adequately pay teachers, administrators, paraprofessionals, and/or fund necessary 8 school supplies and extracurricular activities to enrich students; and 9 10 Whereas, there is insufficient evidence to support the causal role of school resource officers (SROs) decreasing or preventing crime in schools [1,2], but evidence does support an increased likelihood of 11 juvenile arrests for minor, nonviolent offenses in schools with SROs [3,4]; and 12 13 Whereas, students of color have been disproportionately impacted by policing activities within schools [5,6], and students of color are more likely to report feeling unsafe around or distrustful of police 14 15 officers [7,8]; and Whereas, carrying a deadly weapon has been shown to erroneously increase threat detection in the lay 16 public and trained professionals [9,10], that false threat detection is also biased against people of color, 17 particularly young black men [11,12], and that false threat detection can increase the likelihood of using 18 19 deadly force [13]; and 20 Whereas, shooting accuracy in trained individuals has been shown to be decreased during stressful 21 situations, putting bystanders at risk [16,17]; and Whereas, the presence of deadly weapons are associated with unconscious distraction and feelings of 22 threat [18,19] for students, teachers, and staff; and 23 Whereas, rates of school violence have been in consistent decline for over a decade [20]; and 24 25 Whereas, school safety has been positively associated with educational and therapeutic programs [21], 26 and schools that are rated highly on structure and support for their students [22]; now 27 28 Therefore Be It Resolved, that AFT-OR should support gun free school policies at the state and national 29 level; and 30 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR should oppose carry laws that allow guns on university campus; and Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR support educational institutes providing Alert Lockdown Inform 31 Counter Evacuate (ALICE) training for faculty and staff; and 32 33 Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR should not support the hiring or placement of armed guards or 34 SROs in schools in Oregon; and Be It Further Resolved, that AFT-OR should not support the implicit or explicit requirement of teachers 35 36 to carry weapons in schools, or ask teachers to act as law enforcement officers in official or unofficial 37 capacity in their role as instructors; and

- 38 Be It Further Resolved, AFT-OR should support with educational and therapeutic programs that are
- 39 rated highly on structure and support for students; and
- 40 **Be it finally resolved** that AFT-Oregon will take this resolution to the national level.

20	Whereas, right wing figures have hidden behind First Amendment Rights to advance this agenda,
21	claiming that they have the freedom of speech to terrorize different disadvantaged and privileged

RULES RELATING TO COMMITTEES

Changes in assignments of delegates to committees shall be made only by the President. Application for such change must be made by the delegate and submitted not later than one (1) hour before the scheduled time for the start of committee meetings, and shall include a written statement of the reason for desiring the change. Change Request forms are available at the registration table.

(Bylaws Article V, Section 3)

Constitutional Amendments Committee shall be heard in full prior to other committee reports; and shall report only the proposed amendments which it recommends for adoption.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(1))

Each other committee must select the two resolutions or items of business it considers most important for its initial report.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(2))

Committee reports shall be received at the time designated in the printed program.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(3))

Reports shall be made in the order determined by the Chairperson of the Convention Committee and the President who shall make such assignments upon application by the chairs of committees, except that the Convention may desire to receive reports in a different order.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(4))

Once the committee's first two resolutions or items of business have been considered by the Convention, or at the end of an hour, whichever comes first, of each committee's partial report, debate shall be closed and all pending questions shall be put to a vote immediately, unless the time of debate is extended by majority vote of the Convention.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(5))

After all committees have had an opportunity to make their first reports, additional committee reports may be made in the order selected by the President.

(Bylaws Article VII, Section 8(e)(6))

Also Note: [The Executive Council] shall obey the instructions of the Conventions, except that any action by the Convention involving expenditure of funds shall be referred to the Executive Council with power to revise in conformity with the budget.

(Constitution Article VII, Section 2(a))
